

COMMON Bermudagrass

Cynodon dactylon



The original bermudagrass from which all other improved varieties have been developed. Was first introduced into the United States in 1751 and is still used extensively for lawns & pastures today. It is the most cost effective way to plant bermudagrass, with millions of pounds planted annually. Uses include parks, lawns, golf course roughs, pastures, hay production, erosion control, roadsides, cemeteries, etc.

Bermudagrass is a warm season permanent grass that goes dormant in the winter. Plant in full sun when nighttime temperatures are consistently 65° and getting warmer, with at least 6 weeks of establishment prior to first frost. For year round green, overseeding with winter ryegrass is suggested.

Available in Hulled, Unhulled & Coated Seeds

Hulled Seed: (2,000,000 seeds per lb) Has the outer skin mechanically removed to speed up germination. This makes it more likely for the seed to all germinate at near the same time. More hulled seed is planted than any other kind.

Unhulled Seed: (1,400,000 seeds per lb) Has the natural outer skin still intact. Takes 7-10 days longer to germinate than hulled seed.

Coated Seed: (700,000—1,000,000 seeds per lb) Has been coated with a clay based material with trace nutrients to increase successful germination by providing nutrients at the time of germination.

Planting Rates

Lawns: 1-3 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. (45-135 lbs per acre)

Pasture: 10-15 lbs. per acre drilled or broadcast
